Director's Note:

Last week I spent a couple days visiting Western Seminary (my alma mater) in Holland, Michigan. My head is swimming with thoughts and emotions.

About ten years ago, Western Seminary built the Friendship House. Perhaps the first of its kind in the nation, the Friendship House is an apartment building where each three-bedroom unit is occupied by a person with an intellectual disability. The other two bedrooms are

occupied by seminary students. While the seminarians may stay for a year or two, until they graduate, the residents with disabilities (who the seminary calls 'friends') are there for as long as they'd like.

It's been a truly great experience for all involved. As one professor once quipped, "God tends to bless all sides of a triangle."

For the seminary community, the presence of persons with disabilities in their halls and at daily chapel have been a constant reminder that there is joy and fellowship in sharing space with those of all abilities. In the meantime, the seminary is raising new pastors who are ever appreciative of the gifts of those with disabilities.

For the students who stay at the Friendship House, it's been a humbling reminder that they are not there to 'fix' anyone. (Indeed, they often find that they are the ones in need of fixing.) Rather, they are there to simply enjoy community, extend hospitality, and show respect for all, regardless of ability.

For the Friends in the apartments, they are learning the difference between being merely included and actually belonging. (To be included in a group is to be noticed when you're present; but to belong is to be missed when you're absent.)

The long conversations I had with the director of the Friendship House and its residents make me wonder if something like that could happen anywhere – not just in a college town.

I recently read that over 80% of adults with developmental disabilities still live with their parents. A large part of the reason is that there simply isn't adequate housing. While many of these folks cannot live independently, they can function just fine if they had well-placed supports: an apartment mate, personal aide who visited to help with shopping, laundry, and the like, a friend who will stop by on a regular basis.

Marguerite "Maggie" G. Nye



The Nye family have been long and faithful supporters of the Village and its mission of serving those with developmental disabilities. Phil served on the Village of Progress Foundation board until 2006. Maggie then joined the Village's Board of Directors in 2010 and served until her death.

Marguerite "Maggie" G. Nye, 78, passed away in her sleep at home Monday, December 16, 2019 after a long illness. Maggie was born on April 29, 1941 to E. Kevin and

Marguerite (Peltier) Glynn in Chicago, Illinois. In 1959, she graduated from Aquinas Dominican High School and in 1964 she graduated from the University of Iowa with her B.A. in sociology. She was an Illinois Licensed Social Worker and worked for the Rochelle Community Hospital and Serenity Hospice. On June 9, 1964, Maggie married Philip Hastings Nye, Jr. in Chicago, Illinois and they had 3 children together.

Maggie was an avid reader, accomplished oil painter and enjoyed traveling with her husband, Phil. Maggie served on the Ogle County Board from 1982-1992 and again from 2008-2018. She is believed to be the first elected woman to have served on the Board. During her service, she served as Chairman of the Juvenile and Probation Committee, Chairman of the H.E.W. Committee and the Courthouse Restoration Committee. Maggie was a member of St. Bride's Episcopal Church in Oregon, IL, a member of the Rochelle Community Hospital Auxiliary and a member of many boards including The Village of Progress.

Maggie will be remembered as a vibrant and passionate advocate for all who face unique challenges in life. She will be missed greatly.

Our sensory room is space that was specifically designed to help individuals engage their senses and relax. We started with simple fifteen minute hand and foot massages, but we had a list of ideas to improve the room.

Last fall we were able to start redecorating the room thanks to a generous donation from the Chili Pepper Grill and Bar (Diane and JT Wells). They donated the proceeds from their annual Golf Play Day. We were able to paint the walls an earthy green and black out the ceil-



ing tiles. The room has a very calm and warm feel to it. We were also able to add a few fun additions including beautiful light covers, a small foot massager, a portable massaging back pad and weighted blankets.



Dawn Todd, our sensory room lead explains, "It is very rewarding to see the anxiety, tension, and stress melt away after a session. Folks leave the room calm and relaxed."

We have been able to continue the transformation of the room with some wish list donations that included a large bubble tube, several musical CD's that play rhythmic and relaxing music, and fiber optic lights.

Each person that spends time in the sensory room responds uniquely to the experience. It is a favorite activity for many at the Village. We appreciate everyone that donated to make this room

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
