Director's Note:

The other day as I was sitting at my desk I happened to look out my window and saw several volunteers gathering in the parking lot. They were there to go on bike rides with our men and women.

As I watched, they turned and started walking toward the Village, where the bikes were parked and waiting. Then I had this moment where I imagined the scene from the film, "The Right Stuff", where the astronauts are

shown walking side-by-side toward the camera. It's an epic scene.

That's when it struck me. Here were a group of volunteers who had come to the Village simply to provide a little joy and fresh air to people with disabilities. I'm sure they saw their role as quite modest.

But what they fail to appreciate is that their small act of kindness multiplies into a much larger act in the eyes of those they came to serve. In the eyes of our people, volunteers are no less than celebrities. And no sooner had I thought this than one of our women, burst through the doors and, with open arms, yelled out the name of one of the volunteers and ran up to give him a big hug.

Others followed her out and, while not quite as exuberant, had smiles on their faces and were so happy to get started with their friends.

I recall a case worker once told me that, for many who attend the Village, coming here is regularly the best part of their day. And part of that, I expect, is because of the volunteers who, by their mere presence and friendship, make that particular hour the best part of their time here.

And I'm not just talking about the bike club. We have a volunteer who comes to read off the letters and numbers for bingo. We have volunteers who come with their dog to offer pet therapy. Other volunteers go with us to Nash for swimming. Some come in to play board games or work one-on-one with life skills.

VOP FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIPS

For 25 years the Village of Progress Foundation has presented educational scholarships to folks in Ogle County. Applicants must be a resident of Ogle County and a high school senior or full-time college student who either has a disability or is majoring in an area that serves those with disabilities. We offer two scholarships, in the amount of \$1,000 each.

The first Scholarship for \$1000 is made through the generosity of the Pete & Wanda Cacciatore Family. Wanda was a member of the Village of Progress Board of Directors for 10 years beginning in 1988 and has served on the Foundation's Board for over 26 years. Her husband, Pete was also an enthusiastic supporter of the Village. Pete passed away in the fall of 2014, leaving behind a legacy of commitment to the Village and its mission.

This year a scholarship through the Cacciatore Family was given to Amanda Tauch. Amanda is a junior at Illinois State University. She is pursuing a degree in Music Therapy. Amanda lives in Oregon. She has volunteered time to ride bikes at the Village of Progress during the summer months and observed our Music Therapy sessions. Amanda is described as "a person who models kindness, compassion, and a genuine desire to see individuals with disabilities achieve their full potential."

The second scholarship for \$1000 is made possible thru a gift from Larry Young & Friends Charities. Larry Young & Friends Charities partner with the Foundation to help make its annual golf outing a success. Larry Young also serves on the Foundation's Board of Directors.

This year a scholarship through the Larry Young & Friends Charity was given to Gracie Prose. Gracie is a senior holding a 3.96 GPA at Oregon High School. Gracie will be pursuing a degree in Communication. Gracie wrote that she has a deep passion for helping others as well as a keen eye for detail and emotional shifts. She truly tries to use every opportunity available to impact the lives of others. Gracie's reference commended her for the countless volunteer hours that she donated to the Village of Progress; her work as an aide with OCEC students at her high school; and her ability to form immediate connections with people.

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
